At the national level, the philosophy is consistent with a balanced development strategy that would reduce the vulnerability of the nation to shocks and excesses that may arise as a result of globalization.





MARINE AND COASTAL RESOURCES RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT CENTER

History

Initiated by Her Majesty Queen Sirikit, The Sea Turtle Conservation Center was launched on August 11, 1979 at "Koh Man Nai", one of the islands in the eastern Gulf of Thailand. Her significant intention was to conserve sea turtle, which had been becoming endangered species, for next generations of Thai people. Later, the Center has expanded to conduct research on different marine resources, such as: sea cow, dolphin, coral reefs and seagrass.

Mission


1. To survey and assess marine resources conditions in the Eastern Gulf of Thailand including ecological biodiversities of: coral reefs, seagrass, mangrove and endangered species;
2. To develop, conserve, rehabilitate and manage marine and coastal resources for sustainable utilisation;
3. To create public understanding and attitude on marine and coastal resources conservation.

Rak Sa Mae Bridge

Rak Sa Mae Bridge is one of the eco-tourism attractions under the Tourism Rehabilitation and Conservation Mangrove Project in Rayong Province. It is the 100-metre wooden suspension bridge. Interestingly, Walking on the bridge could enjoy not only the beauty of nature but also could experience the abundant mangrove forest.



Rayong Aquarium

This is a significant and well-known public aquarium of Thailand. It is an excellent collection of tropical fish and other marine life found in the region. Visitors are encouraged to learn different aspects of marine resources and also to have direct experiences with living rare and endanger species. The aquarium consists of 3 zones: marine species living zone, fishery zone and seashell museum.

Banphe Market

Banphe Market is a freshly traditional market which is well-known for both local Thais and foreigners. It is 200 - metre from the Pae Port. The most popular items in this market is a variety of fresh seafood serving various demands of customers with reasonable prices, such as cooked meals and fresh seafood with ice package. In addition, different processing foods are also available: seafish, fruits and snacks. Therefore, it becomes a satisfied destination of many Thai tourists. It opens every day, except Monday, from 9 am. - 4 pm,

WANG CHAN FOREST PROJECT

History and background

PTT Reforestation Institute's **Wang Chan Forest Project** was located in a total area of about 351 rai (56 hectares) on the same vicinity of Kamnoetvidya Science Academy (KVIS) and Vidyasirimedhi Institute of Science and Technology (VISTEC) in Rayong. The main objective of the project is to build a large natural classroom for collections of knowledge base gained from PTT's one-million rai (160,000 hectares) under the Reforestation Campaign in Commemoration of the Royal Golden Jubilee Project. Offering integrated knowledge and research in forestry as well as the environment, the project will serve as a key ecotourism destination for the country's eastern region.

In this connection, both the educational development project and the Wang Chan Forest Project represent key projects developed and run by PTT Group. The Group serves as a prototype of an education development organization which also implements corporate social responsibility activities, with the aim of bringing about stability, wealth and sustainability for Thailand.

Learning center 1: Public Green Park

The Park aims at conserving the big urban trees and serving as the green area for public. This initiative also attempts to achieve at least 9 square metres of greenery per person following to the standard of WHO. The data of tree heights and circumferences are collected to calculate the amount of carbon absorption capacity of big urban trees. Moreover, all of those big trees has been registered for monitoring.

Learning center 2: Srikittiwannanusorn municipal school 1 (The model school of sustainable environment management)

With the cooperation of different parties including local administrative organisations, the school board and teachers, students, and community, the environmental Learning Center was established in Srikittiwannanusorn municipal school. Various green activities has been created with their ultimate goals for decreasing carbon emission, such as planting organic vegetables and local herbs, producing compost and bio-fertilizer, recycling waste bank, creating products from used items, and avoiding the foam utilization and other one-time-use materials.

Learning center 3: Learning Center for Sustainable Community (Green Community)

The Center is a good practice in organic waste management. Based on local wisdom, it attempts to collect organic waste from both households and fresh markets and turns to bio-fertilizer, which is environmentally friendly products. As a result, it appears that people in the community are truly a part of the holistic process of waste management.



Learning center 4: Traditional Bamboo Handicraft Center


The Centre was founded in 1978 under the support of The Foundation for the Promotion of Supplementary Occupations and Related Technique of Her Majesty Queen Sirikit of Thailand” or “The SUPPORT Foundation”. It aims to promote and conserve the bamboo handicraft, which is very exquisite and one of local traditions and wisdoms.

Based on the idea of lifting up the incomes of craftsmen and transferring their local wisdoms to younger generation, Pranee, who is the wife of the Ex-mayor of Panat Nikom Municipality, has played her major role in mobilising all craftsmen and products in Panat Nikom area. Then, the Group was created at her residence and it was later developed to the ‘Traditional Bamboo Handicraft Centre’. This Centre provides knowledge on bamboo handicraft to public and gathers information about bamboo craftsmen in the area. Its significant success is the transference of related skill and knowledge from one generation to another. As a result, the centre is well recognized and accepted in both domestic and international communities.

The city of Pattaya welcomes its guests all the year round. The hottest period of the year is considered to be from April till May. The rainiest months of the year in Pattaya are considered to be September and October. Heavy rains are probable in this period almost every day. However they fall normally at night and are rather intermittent so the rains will not badly impact vacation plans.



The main city transport is songthaews which are small open vans following certain routes like common buses. A trip should be paid directly to a driver of a van. Setting off to a city exploration tour travelers should have enough change.

Local shops and stores offer a wide choice of clothes and accessories at reasonable price that is why it is known as shopping paradise for all tourists.

Local markets and private shops welcome bargaining as this is an optimum way to sufficiently reduce a price. Open markets are the best places to hunt some souvenirs, memorable gifts and crafts meanwhile clothes, perfumes and jewelry should be bought in specialized stores and boutiques.


Tip is not compulsory but it depends on willingness and satisfaction of customer.

- An optimum way to pay for goods and services is the national Thai currency. However local shops and restaurants accept US dollars and Euro as well. But in this case a cost may turn higher. Banks offer a more profitable currency exchange rate. Tourists will find numerous private currency exchange offices in Pattaya.


Most popular food in Thailand

Tom yam kung or spicy shrimp soup, is the number one of the top ten Thai dishes loved by foreigners, according to a recent investigation. And in fact, it is one of the most favourite dishes for Thai people as well. It is simply because it is so delicious for its unique sour and spicy taste that you will certainly need it more and more if you try it just once.




som tum Thai

The abundance of fresh ingredients is ever-present in Thai cuisine. A popular Thai dish that showcases fresh vegetables is som tum Thai or green papaya salad.



Som tum Thai is a fantastic raw Thai salad often made of shredded unripe papaya, sliced tomatoes, raw yardlong beans, peanuts, dried mini shrimp, and fresh garlic. Sometimes we find shreds of carrots and green or purple cabbage to add a pop of color. A sweet, salty, tangy sauce made of sugar, lime juice, and fish sauce completes the dish. It can be easily altered by leaving out an ingredient or two (no shrimp for vegetarians), but don't be afraid to try it in its original form.



Pad Thai is a popular street food dish across Thailand. Pad Thai is made from rice noodles, stir fried with eggs, tofu, tamarind paste, fish sauce, dried shrimps, garlic, palm sugar and red chili pepper and frequently served with lime wedges, bamboo shoots, spring onions, raw banana flowers, and topped with a sprinkling peanuts. Yum!

Geng Kheaw Wan Gai (Green curry chicken) is a popular Thai dish which attracts guests not only by its colors but also by its spicy taste. Geng Kiew Wan, literally means "Sweet Green Curry", is carefully-cooked with fine sweet and light tasty spices, delightful taste with the mix of seasonings from green curry & chili paste, sweetness from sugar, blandness of coconut milk and saltiness from fish sauce. Let's serve it with a bowl of steamed rice or enjoyed as a sauce with rice noodles which make it as a Spaghetti.




Moo Sa-Te is a delicious and popular cuisine of Thailand, also one of 10 Thai well-known dishes loved by foreign visitors. Siam

Siam is unquestionably the centre of shopping in Bangkok, home to some of the city's most popular and important shopping centers like MBK Center, Siam Discovery Center, Siam Center, and Siam Paragon. Within Siam Square itself, there is a wide range of shops and services, including restaurants, cafes, designer clothing boutiques, record stores, cinemas, bookshops, a Hard Rock Cafe, hotels and banks. The shoppers vary from young-aged school and college students to office workers, trend-setting city dwellers and, of course, throngs of tourists.

Pratunam is one of Bangkok's most colourful and chaotic areas, and famous for its wholesale fashion factory outlets, street markets, bazaars and armies of local vendors. Pratunam offers bargain prices for all kinds of clothing, apparel, fashion accessories, shoes, watches, jewellery, belts, luggage and then some.

Chatuchak Weekend Market

Once only popular among wholesalers and traders, Chatuchak Weekend Market has reached a landmark status as a must-visit place for tourists. Its sheer size and diverse collections of merchandise will bring any seasoned shoppers to their knees - this is where you can literally shop 'till you drop'. You can hop on the skytrain (BTS) to Mo Chit station, take exit no. 1 and follow the crowd until you see rows of canvas stalls selling clothes. Turn right while continuing to follow the crowd and you will see a small entrance that leads into the market (clothing section).

Asiatique

Asiatique has successfully combined two of the most popular shopping experiences in the city: a night bazaar and a mall. Ten minutes downriver from Saphan Taksin BTS station this once-bustling international trade port has been transformed, with over 1,500 boutiques and 40 restaurants housed under a huge replica warehouse complex. Open from 17:00, spending an evening here is no problem: you'll have good fun browsing the boutiques, picking up gifts or something for yourself: you are guaranteed to find something you would like to eat and if this isn't enough entertainment, shows are performed nightly: Calypso ladyboy cabaret and soon, a classic Thai puppets performance

Khao San Road

Khao San Road has plenty of places for partygoers to choose from. This long entertainment street offers numerous bars and restaurants serving drinks at cheap prices. After the sunset, many mobile bars will take over the roadside, selling buckets full of cocktails. This is one of the most popular precursors to start the night before heading out to sample some of the nearby clubs.

Chinatown

Bangkok's Chinatown is a popular tourist attraction and a food haven for new generation gourmands who flock here after sunset to explore the vibrant street-side cuisine. At day time, it's no less busy, as hordes of shoppers descend upon this 1-km strip and adjacent Charoenkrung Road to get a day's worth of staple, trade gold, or pay a visit to one of the Chinese temples. Packed with market stalls, street-side restaurants and a dense concentration of gold shops.


